Benton REA Donates \$10,000 to Local Food Banks

Ten thousand dollars is helping feed local families thanks to Benton REA and matching funds from CoBank, one of the utility's lenders.

Benton REA received a \$5,000 matching grant from the CoBank Sharing Success program. Together, the \$10,000 donation will help families through three Food Banks within the Benton REA member service area.

Six thousand dollars went to Tri-Cities Food Bank serving West Richland and Benton City, \$2,000 was donated to Jubilee Ministries' Food Bank in Prosser and \$2,000 went to Sunrise Outreach Center Food Pantries in Mabton and Sunnyside.

CoBank's Sharing Success program doubles contributions of its consumer members to the charitable organizations and causes they care about most.



Prosser Jubilee Ministries was founded in 1986 and is funded by their thrift store profits, charitable donations, and the support of local churches and businesses that help keep the food bank stocked with refrigerated and non-perishable food items that they offer for free to residents in need.

Sunrise Outreach Centers' Food Pantries were founded in 2009. Their programs encompass the communities of Yakima, Wapato, Sunnyside, Mabton, White Swan, and Wiley City with the support of hundreds of volunteers. ■

Fall Into Energy Savings

Fall is here. We have been lucky enough to have some beautiful weather, but the chilly days are coming. While temperatures are still mild, it's a good idea to check out some of these tips to help you stay comfortable and cut down on energy use.

Set Your Thermostat

It's important to set your thermostat to a temperature that is comfortable for you and doesn't break the bank. Although it can be tempting to leave the thermostat at a set temperature so it's warm when you get home - this will use more energy and in turn cost increase your heating costs. It's more efficient to heat your home as needed, which means turning the heat down when leaving the house, or setting a smart or programmable thermostat to do so, if you have one. It is possible to save as much as 10% on your heating bills by turning your thermostat back when you are away or sleeping at night.

Check Your Water Heater Temperature

Heating water accounts for much of the energy consumed in households. Check the temperature of your water heater and set it to a comfortable temperature, no higher than 120 degrees.

Cover Drafty Windows with Visqueen/Window Film
If you can feel cold air coming in around windows - it's
time for a do-it-yourself project! Window film covers are

inexpensive, reduce drafts, help the house feel warmer during winter months and reduce moisture buildup on the window due to condensation. They can also eliminate air leaks around the window if they extend over the woodwork, and this extra layer of plastic adds another layer of insulating air to reduce heat loss through the window. The materials are readily available at local home improvement or large box stores.
